Standard Chartered Bank launches back-to-back livelihood projects in Cebu and Samar

Communities from Bantayan Island, Cebu and Catbalogan City, Samar to benefit from livelihood support

12 July 2016, Philippines – Standard Chartered Bank (SCB) is set to launch a back–to–back livelihood projects for communities in Cebu and Samar impacted by Typhoon Yolanda. This is the last phase of the bank's emergency response to the strongest cyclone in recorded history that wreaked havoc in Central Philippines in 2013 claiming thousands of lives and destroying millions worth of properties.

SCB employee volunteers return to Barangay Ticad, Bantayan Island, Cebu to bring livelihood opportunities to one hundred and thirty (130) families displaced by Typhoon Yolanda. In partnership with the Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP), the bank will launch the project CARE or Corporate Assistance for the Recovery of Economic Livelihood for Typhoon Yolanda Displaced Families. The project aims to provide organic vegetable production, food processing, financial inclusion and access to loan assistance for displaced families residing at Gawad Kalinga Village in Barangay Ticad and nearby barangays.

Standard Chartered will also launch its 'Banca ng Buhay project' in Samar. Also in partnership with PBSP, together with the Department of Education (DepEd) and Negrense Volunteers for Change Foundation, Inc, (NVCFI), the bank will donate thirty-eight (38) fiberglass boats to five island barangays in the Sierra Islands of Catbalogan City. Thirty-eight (38) fishermen and their wives will be given livelihood support through fishing and capability training with seed capital to start a small business enterprise. In turn, the fishermen commit to ferry for free over three hundred (300) school children who, otherwise, walk 40 minutes, pay P5 per way or even swim across the sea just to get to school.

Since 2013, Standard Chartered has supported communities affected by Typhoon Yolanda. The bank partnered with the Philippine Red Cross to support its relief efforts. It also supported reconstruction efforts through a donation of a one storey – two classroom school building in Medellin, Cebu and a total of ninety (90) houses in Leyte and Cebu in partnership with Habitat for Humanity and Gawad Kalinga.

Standard Chartered Philippines Head of Corporate Affairs and Brand and Marketing Mai Sangalang says, "For the last three years, Standard Chartered has focused on how to help

families affected by Typhoon Yolanda get back on their feet again. It is just fitting to complete

our support with sustainable livelihood opportunities which will give families a better chance to

fully recover. Our aspiration is to help build a self-sufficient community."

Emergency Response is a key component of Standard Chartered Bank's sustainability agenda.

For the bank, being there in the wake of disasters is a demonstration of its brand promise, Here

for good. It also teaches its employees across its global network to reach out to markets that

may be in need. In the case of Typhoon Yolanda, the funds used to provide relief, shelter and

livelihood were raised through a global staff fundraising drive which the bank matched dollar for

dollar.

But beyond the support during an emergency, Standard Chartered seeks to help rebuild lives.

Through these livelihood opportunities, the bank has come full circle in its support to the

communities affected by Typhoon Yolanda.
